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




Workforce Innovation And Opportunity Act-Allocations at a Glance

Workforce Innovation And Opportunity Act- Youth Allocation





<u>Salaries and Benefits</u>: includes salaries of program administration, general administration, monitoring, and IT.

Other Charges: includes operating and county cost allocation charges such as Auditors', County Counsel and other Internal Service departments.

<u>Services and Supplies</u>: includes rents, leases, maintenance, equipment, etc.

<u>Projects/Summer Youth</u>: budgeted for Summer Youth program and other projects.

<u>Contracts</u>: includes contractor wages, work experience wages, training, supportive services, and other operating costs.

Terms and Requirements



- 75% out-of-school / max 25% in-school
- School Status Determination: is made at the time of program enrollment and does not change throughout the youth's participation.
- "School": refers to both secondary and postsecondary school.
- "School dropout": refers to an individual who has dropped out of high school and not completed their high school diploma or equivalent.

Work Experience

- WIOA requires at least 20% of Youth formula funds must be used for work activities.
- Stanislaus County Workforce Development Board increased this percentage to 30%
- Work activities include:
 - Summer and year-round jobs
 - Pre-apprenticeship
 - On-the-job training
 - Internships



Program Eligibility

Out-of-school youth (OSY):

Aged 17-24, not attending school

AND must meet one of the following:

- School dropout
- Within the age of compulsory school attendance, but has not attended school
- Low-income and either basic skills deficient or an English Language Learner
- Subject to the juvenile or adult justice system
- A homeless individual, a runaway, in foster care or aged out of foster care, a child eligible for assistance under section 477 of the Social Security Act, or in an out-of-home placement
- Pregnant or parenting
- An individual with a disability
- Low-income individual who requires additional assistance to enter or complete an educational program or to secure or hold employment

Program Eligibility

In-school youth (ISY):

- Aged 17-21, attending school, is low-income
 - AND must meet one of the following:
- Basic Skills Deficient
- An English language learner
- Subject to the juvenile or adult justice system
- A homeless individual, a runaway, in foster care or has aged out of the foster care system, a child eligible for assistance under section 477 of the Social Security Act, or in an out-of-home placement
- Pregnant or parenting
- An individual with a disability
- Low-income individual requiring additional assistance to enter or complete an educational program or to secure or hold employment

Service Activities

- 1. Tutoring
- 2. Alternative secondary school services, or drop out recovery services
- 3. Work based learning activities
- 4. Occupational skill training
- 5. Education offered concurrently with and in the same context as workforce preparation activities and training for a specific occupation or occupational cluster
- 6. Leadership development
- 7. Supportive services
- 8. Adult mentoring
- 9. Comprehensive guidance and counseling
- 10. Career Counseling
- 11. Career Awareness
- 12. Career Exploration
- 13. Financial Literacy
- 14. Entrepreneurial Skills Training
- 15. Activities that help youth prepare for and transition to post-secondary education and training.
- 16. Follow-up services for not less than 12 months after exit
